Waste Management Collected Just Over \$340,000 for the Chelan–Douglas Health District in 2015

Fees collected by Waste Management support the following activities and programs:

- » Participate with agency partners in the promotion of public health through the environmental health programs
- » Investigate Health Code violations
- » Investigate disease vector and pest complaints
- » Respond to public and governmental inquiries regarding solid waste
- » Investigate reports of solid waste burning
- » Respond to hazardous waste inquiries
- » Respond to threats of surface and groundwater contamination
- » Educate the public on proper disposal and storage of solid waste
- » Permit, inspect, and monitor solid waste facilities

The above efforts reduce the threat of:

- » Infectious disease from vectors and pests
- » Poisoning and injury from toxic chemicals
- » Food contamination
- » Ground water and surface water contamination
- » Blood borne infections
- » Airborne contamination

- ▶ The Wildlife Habitat Council certified the Greater Wenatchee Regional Landfill for its biodiversity efforts.
- ▶ Nearly 250 local children visited the regional landfill last year to learn about efforts to preserve habitat and biodiversity.
- ▶ Waste Management is committed to improving biodiversity and shares 80 acres of endangered "shrub-steppe" habitat as an outdoor learning lab for local high school students. The 4-H Eco-Stewardship Program has served 18,000 teens from Chelan and Douglas counties in the last 10 years.

Waste Management Contributed Nearly \$300,000 to Douglas County in 2015

Waste Management's landfill operations supported the following Douglas County activities and programs:
